



1. Introduction

SDGs Global Camp is designed as an immersive international learning experience where students from diverse academic and cultural backgrounds engage in shared learning, dialogue, and hands-on exploration. The program emphasizes experiential learning, intercultural exchange, and problem-solving aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Rather than traditional lectures, the camp functions as a collaborative learning platform where students learn with and from each other, integrating academic knowledge, community perspectives, and real-world contexts to cultivate responsible global citizens and future change agents. Through guided inquiry and field engagement, students develop the capacity to interpret global challenges, define problem boundaries, and understand the processes behind social and environmental issues before proposing solutions. Particular emphasis is placed on contextual understanding, recognizing how local environments, cultural values, and practical constraints shape both problems and feasible interventions, enabling students to design realistic and locally grounded solutions rather than purely theoretical ones.

8. Application Process and Timeline

Application Procedure (For Students)

8.1 Apply through your university's Global Affairs / International Office

Students are required to submit their application via the Global Affairs or International Office at their home university.

8.2 Nomination by the home university (by 20 April)

The Global Affairs / International Office will nominate selected students and ensure that all nominees complete the required application form by 20 April.

8.3 Announcement of results (30 April)

Final selection results will be announced on 30 April.

Guidelines for Home Universities

- Selection criteria and process

Home universities may determine their own application criteria, selection process, and timeline. However, it is recommended that nominated students:

Have a minimum GPA of 3.00/4.00, and/or

Demonstrate leadership experience (e.g., student union or student committee members), with supporting evidence (certificate or relevant webpage screenshot).

- Submission of application form

Home universities are requested to nominate 1–2 students by submitting their names via email to <sawasdee.mahidol@gmail.com>

Following the internal selection, please to notify the nominated students and ensure that they complete the application form accordingly.
